

Hepworth & District WI

In September we enjoyed an interesting presentation from Brian Aket on the history of cigarette and trade cards which date back around 150 years. From originally being cards to stiffen cigarette packets and protect the cigarettes they developed into advertising a brand and then enticing smokers to collect sets of cards. During both world wars they were banned as paper was scarce and too valuable and although they recovered their sales after WW1 they did not do the same after 1945 and gradually died out. We saw examples of many interesting cards and particularly of the informative ones such as driving safely before the Highway Code or driving tests existed or Air Raid precautions dating back to 1937. Trade cards are those made by non-cigarette companies and frequently included tea companies such as Brooke Bond or Ty-Phoo.

Our next meeting is back at Hepworth Pavilion on 11th October at 7.30pm when we will be meeting Bryan Thurlow as The Perennial Mr Potter, a poignant story of a Suffolk gardener. On November 9th we will have a topical talk on Poppies and The British Legion by David Kemp. Visitors are always very welcome to come along and see if our monthly meetings are of interest plus all the other WI activities on offer in West Suffolk. 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HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Hepworth Parish Council took place on Thursday 7th September 2017 at the village hall where the following Items were discussed.

Attendees: Mr David Stannard (Chairman), Mr Garry Bloomfield, Cllr Joanna Spicer, Mrs Rosemary Vernon, Cllr Carol Bull, Mrs Nicola Yorke, Mr A Yorke, Mrs Katherine Shearer, Ms Louise Robinson, Mrs Sue Yeomans (Clerk). Members of the Public: Helen Corris, Jeff Beacroft, Ann-Marie Thomas, Richard Hinton

- 1. Apologies -Mrs M MacPherson
- 2. Declarations of Interest There were no declarations of interest
- 3. Co-Option of new councillors Mrs Nicola Yorke and Ms Louise Robinson were co-opted onto the PC
- 4. Minutes of previous meetings were agreed and signed.
- 5. Suspension of meeting to receive reports and hear from members of the public present
 - i. Concerns were raised about the speeding on The Street and in particular HGV lorries. The Parish Council was asked to support a 3.5 ton weight limit this would entail the traffic being redirected to George Hill, Stanton which also has problems with HGVs. Previous attempts to have an HGV ban had been unsuccessful. Ms Corris complained that there is no path to the Bus Stop and Post box at the Barningham End of The Street.
 - ii. Mr Hinton reported that the Speedwatch is going well with new members joining. A request for funding to purchase a portable Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS), was made and quote from Morelock was agreed at £2,409.00. Cllr Bull offered some funds from her Locality Budget with the remainder to come from fund raising and a possible donation from the Parish Council.
 - iii. Report from Cllr Spicer

The County Council is currently reorganising itself. Awaiting appointment of new Engineer.

The County Council have announced a public consultation on significant changes to school transport. It is proposing to provide transport to nearest school only, for Hepworth this is Ixworth. Cllr Spicer is committed to working with Ixworth Free School and Thurston School for solution. Currently 17 children in Hepworth attend Thurston. iv. Report from Cllr Bull - Nothing to report.

6. Finance.The following accounts for payment were agreed:-SALC, 2 x Good Councillor Guide - £8.54; HMRC, Qrt to Oct 17 - £34.40; Came & Company, Insurance - £311.44; Clerk salary Aug-Sep 17 - £337.94; Clerk Expenses July-Aug - 17 £57.26 . The Bank Reconciliation was verified by Cllr A Yorke (see below). Budget for 2018/19 discussed

and approved.

- 7. Clerk's/RFO Report:
 - i. Bank Balances @ 18 Aug 2017 Community (current) account £7,509.56; Business Saver account £1,828.25. Receipts –A VAT repayment of £152.76 Mr J Beales and Miss M Ellis have been removed from the bank signatories and Mrs K Shearer added.
 - ii. Speed Watch Sessions 13 July 6 speeders, 15 Aug 11 speeders, 29 Aug 2 speeders. Application has been submitted for erection of Speed Poles for Speed Indicator Device on The Street.
 - iii. The Speed Indicator Device on the A143 heading towards Diss has twice been reported as not working, on 13 and 31 July 17.
 - iv. Clerk requested holiday 9 October to 5 November, which was agreed.
- 8. Planning Applications There were no planning applications
- 9. Footpaths Market Weston Road. Cllr A Yorke and Cllr Spicer to look at it when engineer appointed.
- 10. Website Most councillors were happy to have their pictures on the website. Those in favour to send a picture to Cllr Shearer for uploading.
- 11. Highways A fallen tree has been reported in the field adjacent to Wood Lane. The clerk will report it.
- 12. Hepworth Village Magazine Content from PC was requested, Clerk to provide summary of minutes
- 13. Village Walks Leaflet The leaflets are due end of September. Roundels and dispenser have been received. Dispenser to be put up at Wood Lane by Mr Stannard. Cllr Shearer to ask Mr Kemp if he would be willing to help her put up the roundels. Cllr Spicer has agreed to pay the 50% costs due.
- 14. Correspondence The W.I. and Parochial Church Council have sent thanks for the donations
- 15. Questions to the chair Provision of a defibrillator was requested. This has been discussed previously and put on hold due to location and power difficulties. Cllr Robinson to look into battery power units.
- 16. Any Other Business

Annual Parish Meeting content was discussed.

Council Mergers – as Cllr Bull had to leave early she was unable to update the meeting. Allotments – discussed, clerk to follow up

Village Welcome Pack – discussed, some amendments suggested

The meeting closed at 10.15 pm

THE REAL HOUSEWIVES OF HEPWORTH VILLAGE

The concept of the "Real Housewives of Hepworth" came from a rare outing for coffee with a non-farming friend of mine, originating from London. It's a tongue in cheek, long-suffering farmer's wife view of life on the farm.

It's 3 am in October, it's not even light yet and five alarms, yes five, sound off in unison. Two electric, easily dealt with by pulling out the plugs, two mobiles, not so easily silenced as they are both on repeat, so turn them off.

"No, don't do that, the driver can't call you" he mumbles at me, looking just about as crumpled as the sheets. Lack of sleep seems to go hand in hand with farming.

Hay ladies have you ever noticed that it's always "her" phone that's used for such purposes, he never answers his anyway, what's the point in having one? OK so I admit it, I am jealous. My phone is the oldest, most cronkiest, could be called an antique, no maybe a bygone, with the back falling off unless it's held on by insulation tape and a signal strength that requires hanging out of the window (or a tree) in order to talk to anyone. I grope for my glasses, never know where they are usually, so finding them is a real challenge at this ungodly hour (sorry vicar) and finally I manage to stop the screeching. The last alarm is his Old Faithful, a wind-up job. Only a man who is technically challenged, with no understanding of the ways of computers, technology or the new remote control for the TV, when you can find it, could operate this one, which rings until the wind-up runs out or it gets tired, I know that feeling.

I slip into my track suit, piled at the side of the bed, colours matching of course, a girl does have to have some principles, apply my "anti-wrinkle" moisturiser, (well, we all need some help – does it work?) which is stashed with my clothes, and head for some caffeine and nicotine in the kitchen.

Not much is said whilst the necessary caffeine and nicotine are taken on board, even when son arrives to help with the task in hand. This is the day we have been waiting for, the last of the fats (large pigs – I don't mean to be condescending, but until I moved to a farm, I thought it was a cream cake) are going to that sausage factory in the sky. Sshh, they don't know yet, and us, sentimental as we are, we don't like to think about their destiny. We have cared for this lot (all 1,170 of them) for thirteen weeks or more.

"In Your Garden" with Tripp Batt of Stanton

Dahlias, Geraniums and semi-hardy Fuchsias – Bring these in for winter protection now. Dahlias can be wrapped in dry newspaper, or dry sand. Pot up Geraniums and Fuchsias and prune them back. Keep them on the dry side during winter and protect from frost. Label them up so that you know what colours they are, for when you bring them out next year.

Once leaves have dropped, hardwood cuttings can be taken for soft fruit such as Gooseberries, Redcurrants and Blackcurrants. This is one of the easiest methods of propagation and is a good way of replacing tired old fruit bushes for free. Cut the newest stems, about 6-10 inches in length if possible, just below a bud, and insert the bottom two thirds into sharp sand or a very free draining soil, either in a pot or a corner of the garden. By this time next year, they should have put on some new growth and will have a root system. The same can be done for a number of ornamental shrubs and trees such as Willow, Dogwoods, Roses and Privets.

Apply an autumn feed to lawns to give it good colour and toughen it up to weather through the winter. To avoid water logging, consider spiking and aerating the lawn in order to keep it in good condition. It is also a good time to scarify, i.e. raking off the build up of dead grass and moss from the surface of the lawn, either by hand or mechanically. Now is the best time of year for laying turf or sowing grass seed.

Tomatoes – outdoor bushes will be vulnerable to frosts, so get as much from them as possible by carefully lifting them and hang these upside down in the greenhouse or shed, for the green fruit to ripen. Those that don't can be used to make a chutney.

Finally, we have our annual machinery demonstration day on the lawns at our Marlows branch on Saturday 14th and Sunday 15th October where there'll be many special offers and opportunities to see new machines in operation. We hope to see you there.
