

Hepworth Remembers

George William Steggles

George was born in Hepworth in 1894, and in 1901 was living in Church Lane with his brother, mother, father and grandfather. By 1911 they had moved to Turnpike road, next door but one to the Duke of Malborough. His Mother was a 'Holden', a family

whose links in Hepworth go back to at least 1746.

George was in the 7th Battalion Suffolk Regiment, and was killed in action on 3rd July 1916, age 23. He is buried at Ovillers Military Cemetery.

His family remained in Hepworth, and records show his parents and brother here in 1939. His brother, Jim died in Hepworth in 1966.

Thomas Sparke Sturgeon

Thomas was born in 1890 in Stanton. He seems to have been known as Spencer (his father was also Thomas Sparke Sturgeon). In the 1891 census the family is living on the Common, Hepworth, and in 1901 they are living at Bullocks Farm. By 1911 his mother, George, and 3 brothers are living on the Walsham Road. Their father is living in Market Weston.

Thomas Sparke Sturgeon enisted at Bury St Edmunds in December of 1914, and was a Private in the 1st Battalion Suffolk Regiment. He was killed in action on 25th May 1915 in West Flanders, aged 25. He is remembered on the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres. By 1939 his mother was living as a widow on the Turnpike Road, Hepworth. His brother, Ivory, served with the Royal Garrison Artillery, and survived the war. He married, had a family and was living in Hinderclay in 1939. He died in 1974.

Horace Talbot

There is some mystery surrounding Horace. The Hepworth Rector mentions him in 1920, which suggests he was known in Hepworth, but the only Horace in the records is born in 1888 in Saxtead, to parents Charles and Rose and with 6 siblings. In 1911 he was living and working at Sheepwalk Farm, Kirby Cane, near Bungay.

Horace was a Private in the Suffolk Regiment, and was transferred to the Agricultural Coy Labour Corp (possibly due to ill health). He died of Influenza in Bury St. Edmunds Military Hospital in 1918, aged 30, and is buried at Bury St Edmunds Cemetery in a Commonwealth War grave. The Suffolk Roll of Honour lists 'Herbert' of the Parish of Hepworth. This is the only place that name appears. Horace does not show up in the database of soldiers who died in WW1. Page 9

- 2. Declarations of Interest. There were none
- 3. Minutes of previous meetings. The minutes of the Meeting Extraordinary Meetings 30th May and 24th June were agreed and signed.
- 4. Matters arising from previous meetings.
- Allotments Cllr Robinson and Clerk to Meet with interested landowner on 6th June 2019. Village Sign replacement – A quote of £4,500 has been received from Mr Adrian Rumbles for his design to be made in metal. The other two candidates who put forward designs were unable to provide costings. Letters have been sent to Thurston Community College and West Suffolk College inviting students to design and make a village sign. No responses yet received, Clerk to follow up in September. Cllr Bull may be able to help with funding from her Locality Budget.Cllr A Yorke to contact Ipswich College Metal Work Department. Renaming of Hepworth Community Webpage to Hepworth Parish Council – Cllr N Yorke has

tried unsuccessfully to change the name; she will instead make changes to the introductory page.

- Neighbourhood Watch Scheme no response was received from the advertisement in the Hepworth Herald. Representatives Mr P Penn for Beck Street and Cllr L Robinson for Church Lane area have volunteered. Cllr Robinson to speak to community police representative to see what support they could give to the scheme.
- Dog Poo Signs Mr D Stannard to put up purchased signs around the village. Cllr A Yorke requested 2 for Market Weston Road.
- Feedback to Returning Officer inadequacy of information to parishioners regarding Uncontested Election. Clerk to write.
- 5. Receive reports and hear from members of the public present: Report from Cllr Spicer :
 - Cllr Spicer expressed her congratulations to the new Chairman, Cllr Robinson. Cllr Spicer and 2 County Council Officers made a visit to Hepworth in relation to the possible development site at Shepherds Grove, Stanton and link roads. The negotiations are at a very early stage. They took seriously the need for traffic calming and an HGV limit in Hepworth should the proposal go ahead.
 - Cuts have been made to bus services, none of which currently effect Hepworth. Cllr Spicer advised raising the awareness of using the service to retain it. Possibly publishing bus times in the Herald.
 - School Transport from September Year 7 pupils will not get transport to Thurston Community College. For routes where transport is offered it is essential parents opt-in if it is required.

Following a complaint regarding the overgrown garden at Blacksmiths Cottage this has been referred back to Enforcement.

Complaints have been received about Chapmans lorries travelling through Hepworth again. This is being followed up by West Suffolk Council.

The newly formed West Suffolk Council will have a Chair and Vice Chair for the first 12

months. Thereafter they could apply to become a Borough and have a Mayor. At present the Chair of Bury St Edmunds Town Council is now Mayor.

The decision on the Springbank Farm Prior Approval Planning Application is pending. Members of the Public

May 2019: May was another month with below average rainfall but with temperatures around average. Rather showery the first half of the month, drier and warmer the second half but showery again towards the end of the month. Those of you with barometers may have seen the very high pressure on the 12th, (1041.6 mb/ 30.76" mercury).

June 2019: The first truly 'wet' month since April 2018, also a warm month but with significant day to day variations of temperature. Apart from the first two days, the first half of the month was wet and rather cool. The 8th, 10th/11th were dismal June days with driving rain and drizzle and poor light and a max. temp of only 12.9°C on the 10th. The second half was slightly drier but warmer, especially in the last week of the month. Unusually, no thunder reported here during the month. Flooding was not a problem during periods of heavy rain, due to the previous dry winter and lower than normal 'water table'.

Over the winter we renewed the first floor door and one of the ground floor windows. Both of these have suffered over the years as they face the prevailing westerly weather. New brickwork was needed including the brick arch over the doorway. Some of the first floor joist ends were rotten, so new ends were made of oak and set on a new oak plate. Having replaced all of the second floor joists, again in oak, the new floorboards, which are now nicely seasoned have been machined and are ready to be screwed down.
