

Letter from Reverend Bladen December 2019

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

I don't know about you but I often struggle with the dark evenings and even darker nights that December brings. So I love it when people begin to decorate their windows, out door trees and even the whole of their houses... and the streets begin to glitter with twinkly Christmas

lights. I find myself smiling even at the gaudiest of lights because there's just something about light in the dark that brings a sense of reassurance and comfort. Lights twinkling and shining in the dark seem to project a sense of hopefulness... and Christmas is a season of light and of hope.

A few years ago in a speech to the House of Lords the Archbishop of Canterbury said "We need a narrative of hope'... and Christmas brings with it that narrative of hope as it reminds us once again that hope came and still comes to us in the form of Jesus. Jesus was and is that hope ...that light in the darkness... that hope in the midst of hardship and despair. He is the light that shines into every corner of gloom, illuminating every corner of fading human hope. The ancient words of Isaiah sum it up beautifully; "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned." This is the narrative of Hope! This is the Good News of Christmas and this is the reason we celebrate ...not just because a child was born 2000 years ago... but because God gave His light to the world and hope through Jesus His son. He is the hope that illuminates the next step for the weary, burdened and broken. His is the hope of a new way for the marginalised and displaced. A hope that frees those enslaved by addiction and lies; A hope of peace and reconciliation for those whose lives are in conflict. A hope that gives us a sense of home and a place of belonging.

Our Christmas lights are only up for a season and however beautiful they are they are only man made and often fail us. But the light and hope of Jesus is for all seasons... for every situation and for every day and for every single one of us... and never fails.

So I hope and pray you have a very Happy Christmas and that in amongst all the festivities you might experience something of the light and hope and love of Jesus.

HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL: DRAFT MINUTES

A meeting of the Hepworth Parish Council took place on Thursday 7th November 2019 at the village hall where the following items were discussed.

Attendees: Ms L Robinson (Chairman), Mrs N Yorke, Mr A Yorke (Vice Chairman), Mr G Bloomfield, Mrs M Waterson, Cllr C Bull, Mrs Ann-Marie Thomas, Cllr J Spicer, Mrs M MacPherson

Members of the Public: Mrs Sue Yeomans, Mr Perry Penn and Mrs Helen Killick

- 1. Apologies: There were no apologies
- 2. Declarations of Interest: There were none
- 3. Minutes of previous meetings: The minutes of the Meeting 7th of November 2019 were agreed and signed.
- 4. Welcome: Chairman L Robinson welcomed Cllr AM Thomas to the Parish Council.
- 5. Presentation: Chairman L Robinson presented Mrs Sue Yeomans with Gift Vouchers and token gifts from Parishioners and Councillors in recognition of her service as Parish Clerk. It was noted that Mrs Yeomans' hard work and support to the Parish Council has been invaluable and she will be missed.
- 6. Receive reports and hear from members of the Public

Report from Cllr Bull: Chapman Lorries – contact has been made with an Enforcement Officer regarding HGV's using the village as a 'cut through'. VOSA are investigating if the site at Knettishall is appropriately licensed. The Parish Council were asked to write to Chapmans as well.

District Council Development plan- asked local landowners if they have land for potential development.

Land belonging to Poplar Farm has been identified as a potential site for housing. This is noted as part of the 10 year local plan currently being developed. The Parish Council will be consulted on this in the near future. Cllr Bull noted that this does not mean it will be developed. This will be considered in association with infrastructure for growth, for example schools, shops and similar assets.

Blacksmith Cottage – trees still causing an issue to neighbouring property, noted to be a civil issue.

Layby - The ditch beside the large layby along the A143 road is noted to be full of rubbish. Cllr Bull will ask the Waste Team for assistance to clear the area. Cllr Bloomfield to assess the size of vehicle needed.

Bury Hub – The new waste disposal/treatment site in Great Barton is opening imminently and has had an impact on bin collection days.

Report from Cllr Spicer: Footpath – The Ramblers Association have requested the reinstatement of an old footpath within the village. This is now going through a second Public Enquiry as the first enquiry did not give adequate notice. Cllr Spicer is going to contact the landowner. Cllr Thomas is going to read through the information Cllr Spicer has so that the PC can make an informed decision prior to offering any comment. There will be a public meeting on 14th January 2020 at Recreation hall.

Boundaries – The consultation on boundaries has been deferred to next year following the impending election. Options are still being assessed and the Blackbourne Ward may be extended. Hepworth is surrounded by Mid-Suffolk wards so it's unlikely we will be affected but we will be asked to give input when the process starts in 2020.

Stanton Development – The Master Plan is currently with West Suffolk District Council, the plan will be issued for consultation in due course. The impact on traffic through Hepworth is still very much front of mind and will be raised appropriately when the plan is issued. There is a smaller development by Bloor for 200 homes, currently at planning stage at the other end of Stanton – opposite the garage. Members of the Public: There were no public comments

- 7. Correspondence: Local Electricity Bill Chairman L Robinson noted there is a bill regarding a change in law that allows renewable energy to be sold locally. The information regarding this change is to be shared in the Herald, on Social Media and via the Village Website so all parishioners are able to comment.
 - Letter from P Newberry We have received a letter from Pam Newberry regarding the reinstatement of the path in Market Weston Road. This and the planned reinstatement will be added to the January agenda.
 - Traffic Speed Device Purchased and generously donated to Hepworth by Richard Argent of Wup-doodle Letter to be sent thanking Richard for his generosity.
- 8. Parish Clerk Vacancy: Candidates shortlisted, Two candidates to be interviewed.
 Interviews to be arranged. Salary to be confirmed with candidates by Chairman L
 Robinson
- 9. Notice Board: Parish council notice board vandalized. Cllr A Yorke has assessed the Notice Board and reported that the backing needs repair and the Perspex needs replacing. Cllr Yorke will organise the repair.
- 10. Commemorative Plaques: Cllr MacPherson will order the plaques and cover the difference in cost as a personal donation.
- 11. Commemorative Trees: Perry Penn has suggested Hornbeam Trees as an alternative to the Yew. Cllr Robinson is checking the budget and funds with Sue Yeoman prior to a decision. Funding and upkeep to be added to the January agenda.
- 12. FB Page: Cllr Waterson to set up Facebook page as a means of engaging with residents alongside the Hepworth Herald and the Village Website.
- 13. Herald Donation: Agreed that the Parish Council will donate £200 for 2020. This will be split £100 over 6 months x 2 to cover Parish Council information inclusion in the Herald
- 14. Over 60's Xmas Lunch: Donation from Parish Council of £250 agreed.
- 15. Finance: The following accounts for payment were agreed: Recreation Hall hire invoice, up to December 2018; Sue Yeomans overtime; Purchase of bulbs for planting in village; Purchase of Hi Vis jackets for members of the public spreading grit; Parish recharge for non- contested election. Payment to West Suffolk Council.
- 16. Draft Budget: Draft presented to Councillors in readiness for discussion in January
- 17. Planning Application: Walnut House "No comment" response to be put forward to West Suffolk Planning Office.
- 18. Code of Conduct clarification on voting practice show of hands Is a permitted process.
- 19. Questions to the Chair: Please include these items on next agenda: Mud on road at North Common; Play Area; VE Day



September 2019: A warm but rather wet month. Dry, the first half overall but very wet the last 7 days of the month, when 82% of the months total fell. No air or grass frost recorded during the month.

October 2019: A wet month with average temperatures. October continued the trend of the last week of September. The 5th/6th gave periods of persistent heavy rain here with a total of 46.6mm in 33 hours. Normally a months worth of rain! This caused widespread flash flooding in the area, with an intense muddy 'run off' from adjacent fields. The normally quiet stream along The Street rose to road level within 2 hours during the morning of the 6th. In the 12 years that I have lived here, I have not seen it rise so fast. 1 grass frost during the month (-0.4°C on the 28th). No air frost, consequently plenty of bloom in the garden at the months end.
