

TRAVELS DOWNUNDER - A REMINISCENCE

Part 12

We left our explorers investigating the sights of Perth and surrounding areas, whilst waiting for better weather...

As mentioned in our last chapter we didn't want to venture too far north until the end of April so we were still exploring Perth and the surrounding area well into April and decided it was one of the nicest areas we'd been to so far, but as we said before, it's just so far away from the rest of the world.

The port of Fremantle, or Freo as the locals call it, is very laid back with lots of cafes and bookshops and old buildings with ironwork balconies. Not so attractive is the port area itself where we saw huge ships being loaded with live sheep for export. Australia exports about two million sheep annually, mostly through Fremantle, to the Middle East for Halal slaughter.

I'm quite a big sports fan and was keen to go and see an Australian Rules football game. The season had just started and we managed to get tickets to watch the next available game. It was in Perth at the Subiaco Oval Stadium, which is shared by the West Coast Eagles, from Perth, and the Fremantle Dockers, from Fremantle. The game we saw was between the Dockers and Carlton from Melbourne. We traveled to the stadium by train and were surprised that supporters from both teams were on the same train as each other and there was a lot of lighthearted banter, all good natured. We couldn't help comparing it to England where opposing fans would probably have been fighting each other!! As for the match we had no real idea of what was going on but those in the crowd near us were more than happy to explain and eventually we started to get the hang of it. It was all pretty chaotic but in the end the Dockers ran out the winners 15/11. Good fun entertainment.

We had been told that one of the things you simply must do whilst in Perth is to have fish and chips on Cottesloe Beach. We duly obliged and went one evening as the sun was setting over the ocean. It was very nice, the setting was lovely, but I have to say I think British fish and chips are much better.

We eventually left Perth and started wending our way up the coast. At Cervantes there is a very unusual area called The Pinnacles where there are hundreds of limestone pillars which can be up to 12ft tall and cover a very large area. We camped overnight in the bush with about half a dozen other rigs of various types. One couple were in a converted 50 seater coach which was their permanent home. There was also a young Dutch couple who had driven a Land Rover all the way from Holland to Australia via just about every country you could think of. There were a few stories told and a few beers consumed around the camp fire that night...


SUFFOLK LIBRARIES


ROE DEER

A Letter from the Rectory - February 2023



Dear Friends

I'm writing this letter in the middle of January and it's wet and cold and grey outside. I've just spent half an hour on my exercise bike desperately trying to keep my New Year's resolution to get fit going... and it's hard. I'm one of those people who could very easily hibernate through the dark and cold months and only come up from under the duvet when the sky is blue again and there's a distinct sense of Spring in the air.

As I struggled to keep up with the pace set on my bike I was listening to 'The Bible in One Year' morning pod cast and the speaker was talking about the passage in the Bible from Matthew 9:18-25. In the passage the leader of the Synagogue comes to find Jesus; he kneels before Him he says "My daughter has died. But come and put your hand on her, and she will live. Jesus took His disciples and went to the Synagogue leader's home. People outside were weeping and wailing... Jesus told them to 'go away'... 'she is not dead just sleeping' He said. Jesus went into the room He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum!", (which means "Little girl, I say to you, get up!")... and she got up!

As I continued on my exercise bike... looking out across the bleak wet and windy playing field I had this feeling that the girl in the bible could be symbolic of how we can often feel at this time of the year. For many life seems hard... there can a heaviness to life and we feel listless and almost lifeless in our lack of motivation and enthusiasm... perhaps even a lack of hope... especially when the skies are grey.

If that's how you're feeling I would encourage you to imagine Jesus taking your hand... and calling you to 'get up'. The little girl in the Bible passage didn't appear to be able to get up on her own... but with Jesus' help... as He took her hand... her life took on new meaning.

It's this hope of light and life in the midst of the darkness and the sometimes greyness of life that the Christmas Story is all about. Jesus came to be that light and that hope for every single one of us. He offers us His hand... to help us to rise up to a better place and a better way of being... and to the new life that He offers.

It might be that by the time you're reading this we have an early Spring and the signs of life and hope are all around us in God's creation... but if that's not the case and you find yourself struggling (as many of us do this time of year), I encourage you to hold out your hand and simply pray, "Jesus would you come and take my hand and lift me up" and then begin to see His Light and His hope begin it's wonderful work in your life.

"Talitha koum!"

Hepworth Parish Council is looking for an enthusiastic and self-motivated person who is community minded and enjoys working with the public, to take on the role of Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer.

The post is for a 4.5 hours per week, home based and includes attendance at all Parish Council meetings which are usually ten a year.

Duties include:

- Organising and attending council meetings, preparing agendas and writing minutes
- Maintaining the village noticeboard
- Uploading parish council documents to website
- Maintaining files and documents
- Implementing the Council's decisions
- Attending to email correspondence
- Managing the finances, preparing the annual budget, requesting the precept and reporting finances to the Council

HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL - DRAFT MINUTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

HEPWORTH PAVILION - THURSDAY 10 NOVEMBER 2022@1930

PRESENT: Councillor Garry Bloomfield (GB) (Chair), Councillor Marjorie MacPherson (MM), Councillor Louise Robinson (LR), Councillor Perry Penn (PP), Councillor Nicholas Bennett (NB)

IN ATTENDANCE: Christopher Garman (Parish Clerk) (CG), County Councillor Joanna Spicer (JSp), One member of public was present.

22/131 PUBLIC FORUM: a) The Parish Council was asked to keep residents informed about the Shepherds Grove development and any consultations. It was suggested that there be a specific meeting for considering the application.

b) There were concerns raised about the service levels at the dispensary at Stanton Surgery and it was specifically pointed out this relates to the dispensary and not the other areas of the practice. It was mentioned that there were significant delays in getting medications and long wait times often outside the surgery which was not good in poor weather conditions. It was suggested that this was affecting people's wellbeing. It was recognised the changes the dispensary has been through recently and that other dispensaries and pharmacies were experiencing similar difficulties in obtaining drugs and having adequate qualified staff. It was asked that the Parish Council write to Stanton Surgery expressing the concerns and asking what will be done to improve the situation, and it was agreed to do so.

22/132 REPORTS FROM AND QUESTIONS TO BOTH DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS: a) JSp spoke about the developments with the Bloor Homes planning application in Stanton. JSp gave an update on the TPO in respect of trees at the rear of Church Close, Hepworth and there was a discussion on how this was moving forward. JSp said contractors were planned to do the resurfacing of Weston Lane during November. JSp spoke about the current situation with the traffic calming which is proceeding as planned. JSp talked about the change in the speed limit at the south end of The Street, Hepworth and the consultation. There was a discussion about an email received from a resident where there were concerns walkers and dogs were straying away from footpaths and the dogs were not under control.

b) CB was not present but had previously emailed to say the locality grant of £1275 for the village gates was proceeding and that from her angle there was nothing new in respect of the proposed Shepherds Grove development.

22/133 APOLOGIES: Councillor Justin Seldis (JS) had offered his apologies and these were accepted. District Councillor Carol Bull (CB) had also sent her apologies.

22/134 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST: MM declared an interest in agenda item 9 (a)

22/135 REQUESTS FOR DISPENSATIONS: None.

22/136 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING: The minutes of the meetings held on 20 October 2022 had been previously circulated. It was resolved that these were an accurate record of the meeting.

22/137 MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES: None.

22/138 VILLAGE ASSETS, TREES AND HIGHWAYS:a) There was an update in respect of the traffic calming project under JF's report at 22/132 (a) above. It was considered there was nothing further to discuss at this stage.

b) There were no other issues.

22/139 FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: a) The following payment was considered for approval. £43.20 to Hepworth Recreation Ground – hall hire. It was resolved to approve this payment.

b) An income and expenditure statement with budgets for the year to 30 September 2022 had been previously circulated together with a bank reconciliation and bank statement. These documents were considered. It was resolved to confirm that the bank reconciliation agreed with the bank statement.

c) Donations to Royal British Legion and Headway Suffolk were considered. It was resolved to donate £25 to Royal British Legion but to decline to donate to Headway Suffolk.

d) The draft budget for 2023/2024 had been previously circulated was considered. There were some thoughts on amounts to possibly be considered for projects and grants. It was thought that the precept increase should be capped at 3% and expenditure managed accordingly. CG was asked to factor these thoughts into a revised draft budget for consideration at the January 2023 meeting.

e) There was discussion on the future use of social media to communicate Parish Council news. It was considered appropriate for the time being to suspend social media activities.

22/140 PLANNING MATTERS:a) It was noted that there were no developments in respect of the proposed development at Shepherds Grove.

b) There was no report on pending applications.

22/141 PARISH COUNCILLOR VACANCIES: It was noted that there was no appetite for an election in respect of the second vacancy and that the two vacancies could now be filled by co-option. It was reported that an advert seeking new councillors will be placed in the Hepworth Herald and the noticeboard with a view to hopefully having some names to consider at the January 2023 meeting.

22/142 CORRESPONDENCE: a) The matter of the email from a resident with concerns about people straying from footpaths and dogs not being under control was again considered. It was thought this is perhaps a matter for the landowner to pursue if appropriate but if there were issues with the footpath signage then this should be referred to SCC. CG will respond accordingly and signpost to SCC and JSj if deemed appropriate.

b) Other correspondence had been previously circulated and no further action was considered necessary.

22/143 QUESTIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN: There was a discussion about the condition of various hedges around the village and perhaps polite requests to landowners was needed.

22/144 DATE OF NEXT MEETING: The next Parish Council meeting which will be an extra ordinary meeting on Thursday 17 November 2022 and then a meeting on Thursday 19 January 2023 at 7.30 pm.

The meeting closed at 8.50 pm.

b) It was highlighted that the work to the surface of Weston Lane had not been completed and CG was asked to contact JSp.



Voter ID

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote? - You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

For more information on which forms of photo ID will be accepted, visit <http://electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID> or call their helpline on **0800 328 0280**.

If you don't have an accepted form photo ID - If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a **Voter Authority Certificate**. You can apply for this at

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to the electoral services team at your local council.
