

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Letter from the Rectory

Dear friends,

As I write this letter in the middle of June on a cold grey and rainy day the thought of Summer and summer time seems to still be far way. I very much hope that by the time you read this, we will be heading into proper warm summer weather.



It seems to me that there's something about the months of July and August and the warmer weather which draws most of us to look for a change in the pace and rhythm of life. I don't know whether it's the pattern of the end of the school year which we grew up with or whether it's just something about the warmer season, but once we reach July I long for a slower pace of life and a break from my usual routine of life and work. Our lives are so busy, aren't they ? Even those who are retired tell me they're busier than ever. PASSION FOR PIGEONS - Part 3

Fast forward to 1982. I was now married with 2 children, a degree in Mechanical Engineering and had represented Eastern Counties at rugby union. The pigeons were kept at my parents house, with my younger brother taking an interest in them.

With the purchase of our first house, I informed Josie (my wife) that I could now start racing my pigeons from our own home. "What pigeons?" was her reply. She honestly thought that the pigeons at my parents house were my brothers! Josie has always stood by with whatever decision I have made whether it was my career or financial. A loft was duly erected and about 20 young birds were bred or gifted by local fanciers. I joined the local club "The Fanshawe" (famous for The Dagenham Girl Pipers). Peterborough was the racepoint and I entered about 10 of my 20 - a distance of about 72 miles. Your loft or shed was pricked on an ordenence survey map (no google maps in those days) and the distance from the racepoint to loft was calculated. Raceday came. No birds into London before 1 o'clock as most people worked Saturday mornings. 2 birds came back together. The rubber was taken off their leg and put into the clock. Handle turned and the time recorded. Then the long wait for the others.

The reading of the clocks was a nervous time. No WhatsApp, Facebook etc. so no one knew each others time. It was silent whilst clocks were read with other fanciers trying to listen to the times frantically calculating in their heads if they had been beaten. We finished 3rd and 6th from over 200 pigeons.There was also a 2 bird nomination for which I was 1st and 2nd. Loads of well done and congratulations.

A few pints later as I walked home I whacked my new clock on a gatepost cracking the glass. So what I won I quickly spent buying a new glass for my clock! Till next time

- 24/65 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST: None declared.
- 24/66 APOLOGIES: Councillor Marjorie MacPherson sent her apologies which were accepted.
- 24/67 PUBLIC FORUM: No issues raised.
- 24/68 REPORTS FROM AND QUESTIONS TO BOTH DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS: JS reported the following:Traffic Survey. Suffolk Highways are planning to repeat the traffic survey along The Street in October. JS was currently querying how this would be funded. It was agreed that the Clerk would approach Hepworth SpeedWatch to obtain monthly average speed data from the Speed Indicator Devices for April and May 23 and April and May 24 to assist with the planned review of effectiveness of traffic calming measures installed last year.

A1088 Bridge Repair. Suffolk Highways would be reconstructing the bridge on the A1088 by Bridge Farm from early July to early December 24; this would mean the A1088 would be closed at this point and traffic diverted along the A143/A14. Further information will be published by the County Council at https:// www.suffolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/lorrymanagement/bridgefarm-bridge-a1088-stowlangtoft.

Weston Lane. JS agreed to follow up why the approved works on Weston Lane had not yet started.

- 24/69 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING: Minutes of the meeting held on 16 May 24 had been previously circulated and it was resolved that these were an accurate record of the meetings.
- 24/70 MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES: Minute 24/60 16 May 24: Planning Concerns. The Clerk confirmed that the agreed list of planning concerns over the management of the Jaynic planning application had been passed to Director (Planning and Growth), West Suffolk Council on 24 May 24. CB agreed to check progress of West Suffolk Council's response. Mindful of West Suffolk Council's

Customer Service Standards, it was agreed that if no response was forthcoming by 27 June, the Clerk would contact the Chief Executive to hasten a reply.

Minute 24/61 16 May 24: Traffic Survey. Update provided in Minute 24/68.

24/71 FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: a. Finance Report. The meeting noted the finance report (current account balance £11.428.54, savings account balance £7,000.00 and the projected outturn at the end of the FY of approx. £3,800 current account and £7,000 savings account). The following payments were authorised: Audit fees £90.00; Clerks Salary & Exps £979.94; The Clerk was to seek counter authorisation from LR for BACS payments.

b. Audit Report. The meeting noted the contents of the previously circulated audit report which raised no observations.

c. Governance Report. The meeting approved the previously circulated Annual Governance Report covered by Section 1 of the Hepworth Parish Council Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2023/24. The meeting also confirmed that the Parish Council was exempt from a limited assurance review as its gross expenditure for 2023/24 did not exceed £25,000. It was resolved that the Clerk was to return the signed Certificate of Exemption.

d. End of Year Accounts. The previously circulated Accounting Statements covered by Section 2 of the Hepworth Parish Council Annual Governance and Accountability Return 2023/24 were approved.

e. Events Noticeboard. The Clerk reported that permission to site the proposed events noticeboard had been obtained. As agreement to purchase this item had already been resolved (see minute 24/4 February 24), the Clerk was to proceed with the purchase for delivery to GB pending installation.

f. Extension of Lease for Recreation Ground. The meeting noted the pre-circulated brief by the Clerk following his initial meeting with Ashtons Legal. It was agreed that the mutual break clause and right of renewal should remain in the revised lease and that the Ashtons Legal letter of agreement should be accepted. The meeting resolved to pause registering the title of the recreation ground with the Land Registry until the lease renewal process had completed.

24/72 PLANNING MATTERS: Jaynic Email. The meeting noted the precirculated email that confirmed that Jaynic would not appeal West Suffolk Council's decision to refuse their planning application. It was agreed that the Clerk would invite Jaynic to the 18 July 24 Parish Council meeting to listen to Jaynic's intentions of a new outline planning application at Shepherds Grove prior to consultation on a new Masterplan. The Clerk was to research Hepworth Parish Council's input to the 2019 Masterplan for Shepherds Grove. and CB loft the mosting at 8.25 nm

JS and CB left the meeting at 8.35pm

- 24/73 HIGHWAYS MATTERS: The Clerk reported that he had been contacted by a member of the public concerned about reduced visibility at the junction of The Street/Market Weston Rd. After confirming that the Parish Council was not responsible for matters of highway safety and that this issue had not been reported to Suffolk County Council, who were responsible, the Clerk agreed to report the issue using the Suffolk Highways Reporting Tool.
- 24/74 CORRESPONDENCE: . West Suffolk Local Plan 2024 Public Examination. The meeting noted the start of the public examination of West Suffolk Council's Local Plan 2024.

b. Hepworth PCC letter. The meeting noted the pre-circulated thank you letter in relation to the recent grant provided.

c. SARS letter. The meeting noted the pre-circulated thank you letter in relation to the recent grant provided.

d. Lighthouse Women's Aid letter. The meeting noted the precirculated letter and agreed that the Clerk would approach the charity for publicity material that could be placed on noticeboards and in the village newsletter.

24/75 QUESTIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN: a. Jaynic Visit. PP queried if the Jaynic attendance at the July Parish Council meeting would be advertised. It was confirmed that this would be visible in the published agenda for this meeting.

b. Weston Lane. The meeting noted that the works for Weston Lane had been previously due to start in November 23 (minute 23/127 November 23) and in February/March 24 once weather improved (minute 24/19 February 24).

24/76 DATE OF NEXT MEETING: It was agreed that the next Parish Council meeting will be on Thursday 18 July 24 at 7.30pm.

The meeting closed at 8.50 pm.

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TRAVELS DOWNUNDER - A REMINISCENCE Part 21

The travellers have reached the largest city in the world at Mount Isa

After leaving Mt ISA we started to head north towards the Gulf of Carpentaria, with a small diversion en-route to Gregory Downs via the Burke and Wills Roadhouse. This roadhouse was named after the two Victorian explorers, Burke and Wills, who led a disastrous expedition through this area in the 1860s. They were hopelessly inexperienced, carried way too much unnecessary equipment and the expedition failed and they both died. Still, it's nice that they have a roadhouse named after them. At Gregory Downs we camped in the bush for a couple of nights in a boulder strewn dry river bed. We met a very interesting married couple here who we travelled with for several days. They were from Western Australia and were taking time off work to travel. He was a prison officer and some of the stories he told us would make your hair stand on end. The prison he worked in was full of very violent men, mostly murderers. The scenery here was rugged but really stunning. At Lawn Hill Gorge we managed to hire a canoe and went on a day trip on the river through the gorge. A great experience but it wasn't until we got back we discovered that there are crocodiles in the river. When we expressed alarm at this we were told "it's alright, they're only freshies, they're very shy and won't hurt you". Freshwater crocodiles are supposedly less dangerous than their salt water cousins.

That night, still with our new found friends, we decided to have a campfire. Sadly there was very little available wood lying on the ground, but there were plenty of dead branches still attached to trees, but seemingly out of our reach. By this time a few beers had been consumed and we decided the only way to reach these branches was for one of us to get on the shoulders of the other one. He being the younger and stronger offered to put me on his shoulders. This was attempted and after much staggering and falling and wives laughing hysterically, we managed to get enough wood to build a fire. A very memorable evening, sitting round a camp fire, out in the bush in the middle of nowhere, drinking a few "tinnies".

Moving on we made the coast at Karumba where we parted company with our new friends who were planning to stay for a while to do some sea fishing in the gulf. We headed east across the bottom of Cape York Peninsula via Mt Surprise and across the Atherton Tablelands. Very different scenery and very pretty countryside. Northwards again, we travelled through the tropical Daintree Rainforest, absolutely stunning, and reached the coast at Cape Tribulation, so named by Captain James Cooke in 1770 when he ran aground on a part of the Great Barrier Reef and had to beach his ship for repairs. One of the most beautiful spots we'd been to but sadly no swimming here as there are plenty of things in these waters which will kill you, salt water crocodiles and deadly jellyfish just for starters.

each table for sampling: Comte, Brie de Meaux and Forme d'Ambert. This tasting was accompanied by French bread and butter. Delicious.

There followed a meal of chicken chasseur and new potatoes - a typical French dish of chicken, mushrooms, tomatoes and herbs traditionally foraged by a hunter and prepared on returning home. (La chasse is French for the hunt and Le chasseur is a hunter) No fine meal is complete without a delicious dessert and this was individually served lemon possets and superb, buttery



shortbread biscuits. All the dishes were prepared and cooked by members of the Hepworth 2 Enjoy team.

To add to the atmosphere there was music by an accordionist Mark Armstrong from Stanton Folk Group who kindly gave of his time to support our evening. Indeed after the meal a few brave people took to their feet to dance. And of course the Hepworth Angels were there to introduce those well known French songs Frere Jaques, Sur le pont d'Avignon and Alouette encouraging audience participation.

It was a most enjoyable, well attended evening which sold out promptly. Do look out for our next fund raising evening and come along and enjoy it within our Hepworth community.
