markers along the routes are being installed over the next month.

- A meeting of the Hepworth Parish Council took place on Thursday 15 th March 2018 at the village hall where the following Items were discussed.
- Attendees: Mr D Stannard (Chairman), Mrs R Vernon, Cllr C Bull Cllr J Spicer, Mr A Yorke, Mrs K Shearer, Ms L Robinson, Mr G Bloomfield, Mr P Penn (Tree Warden), Mrs M MacPherson.

Members of the Public: Mrs A-M Thomas, Mrs W Summerell

- 1. Apologies Mrs N Yorke, Mrs S Yeomans (Clerk)
- 2. Declarations of Interest Mr D Stannard and Mr G Bloomfield signed for item 6. Hepworth Recreation Ground Committee
- 3. Minutes of previous meetings The minutes of 4th January 2018 were agreed and signed.
- 4. Matters Arising from previous meetings The defibrillator and signs will be erected this week. Ms L Robinson has been in contact with Stuart from Hopton to provide CPR training.
- 5. Suspension of meeting to receive reports and hear from members of the public present
 - i. Mrs W Summerell presented information about a mobile mast scheme for village churches. Mrs M MacPherson will be taking this information to the next meeting of the Hepworth PCC. Opinions to be gathered at the APM in April.
 - ii. Report from Cllr Spicer Cllr Spicer gave her apologies for her absence at the previous PC meeting in January. She asked whether the Hepworth Village Walks leaflet had been delivered, suggested it was made available locally. Mrs K Shearer was meeting SCC next Thursday to arrange for the waymarkers to be installed. There will be a public hearing regarding the footpath claim along Wood Lane at Hepworth Village Hall on Tuesday 20 th March at 10am. A small section has been disputed. Cllr Spicer suggested that the proposed Shepherd's Grove development would provide both benefits and disadvantages. Further details will become available as the plans develop. The speed indicator sign by Sutton Close on the A143 is no longer working. The PC agreed they would like a new speed indication sign. Cllr Spicer will pursue this with Highways. A survey is being carried out by the Mobile Library team to determine how the service is used. Cllr Spicer is asking Suffolk County Council for Parish Council involvement to help promote the survey. Hepworth PC to ask residents to complete the survey if they can. Details on the website and the Hepworth Facebook page. Suffolk

County Council Highways Engineer to come and look at the former footpath along Market Weston Road. She will be putting together a proposal with Cllr Spicer. SCC have indicating that the drainage team would be pursuing the problem of the flooding on the Hepworth to Barningham road. There appeared to be no problems with the ditches either side of the road. Mr D Stannard asked for a detailed response from the SCC Highways team as none had been received so far. Cllr Spicer will arrange for larger flood warning sign. Potholes are being dealt with and Cllr Spicer asked parishioners to keep reporting them. Ms L Robinson asked whether the A143 between Hepworth and Stanton would be looked at as part of the road repairs? No plans known to include this section of road as major resurfacing works had been carried out there relatively recently. The home-to- school consultation being carried out by Suffolk County Council is now closed, several meetings on the subject have been planned.

- iii. Report from Cllr Bull A review of the ward boundaries in West Suffolk has resulted in no change for the Barningham Ward. The Parish Council was happy with the current ward boundary. There has been a problem with fly tipping in the lay-by between Hepworth and Stanton on the A143. The landowner and St Eds BC have been addressing the problem, with plans to install signs and rubbish bins. The owner of Blacksmiths Cottage, The Street has assured that work to tidy up the plot will be carried out. Cllr Bull asked members of the PC whether they felt that police visibility was good in the parish. The general response was no. The public can dial 101 to contact local police. Ms L Robinson asked whether it would be useful to start a Neighbourhood Watch Group again? B/F to APM in April. A pool of S106 money, totalling £3,373.11, from planning application SE/13/0574 is available to Hepworth. The monies need to be spent on public open space, play or green infrastructure, or community facilities. Ideas will be gathered from parishioners at the APM in April.
- 6. Finance The following accounts for payment were agreed:- Hepworth Recreation Ground Management Committee £88.00, Clerk Expenses (Jan-Feb 2018) £72.50, Clerk Salary (Dec 17-Jan 18) £372.99, Kallkwik Defibrillator Signs £87.00, Clerk reimbursement for payment to Morelock Signs Ltd £2926.80, SALC payment for Councillor training £120.00, Ms L Robinson, new Councillor training expenses £45.00, It was agreed that SALC should be appointed as internal auditors for Hepworth Parish Council. It was agreed that an Exemption from Limited Assurance Review Certificate should be submitted to the External

- Auditors. It was also agreed, in principle, to appoint external auditors for 2017/18.
- 7. Clerk's/RFO Report 1. Bank Balances @ 19 February 2018, Community (current) account £6,088.75, Business Saver account £1,828.57, 2. Speed Watch Sessions 17 January 2 speeder, 26 Jan 1 speeder, 8 Feb 13 speeders., 2 x battery packs for the Speedar SR1 Radar Gun @ £25.00 each + £9.35 postage have been, ordered, payment to be taken from CSW Fund surplus., A M-SID Compact Radar Speed Sign has been ordered at £2,439.00 + VAT £487.80. £739.00 has, been received from Cllr Bull's Locality Budget towards the purchase. 3. A request has been made to SCC for installation of a pole to house the defibrillator sign opposite to the entrance to Stimsons Yard on The Street.
- 8. Planning Applications There were no planning applications
- 9. Shepherd's Grove Development See Cllr Spicer's report. Mr D Stannard said that the parish would be involved in any consultation.
- 10. Changes to School Transport See Cllr Spicer's report. NY to put on Hepworth FB page.
- 11. Footpaths See Cllr Spicer's report above. Mr D Stannard will attend meeting with engineer.
- 12. Highways The flooding and Speed response were discussed during Cllr Spicer's report.
- 13. Battles Over 11 November 2018 Mr A Yorke reported on the progress of plans for the Battles Over event Sunday 11 th November. A bugler had been appointed to sound the Last Post, with an offer of backup support. It is not possible to ring the church bells at St. Peter's, but church bells will be amplified over speakers for the event. The loan of period uniforms has been offered by the Suffolk Yeomanry Regiment. St. Peter's Church to open for the event. Mrs M MacPherson has been researching the background of the fallen soldiers remembered on the Hepworth War Memorial. Thanks to Maggie Morrison in particular for her help in gathering information. Appeal made for any further information, memories, or memorabilia from parishioners who were connected to any of the fallen soldiers to be displayed in the village hall on 11 th Nov. There are two individuals in particular who have very little information of their association to the village - Major Claude Stuart Lyon MC & Bar and Herbert Talbot. Suffolk Yeomanry Regiment have been helpful with research. Church Warden's records may also provide information. Hepworth Herald appeal to be made for information and items for display. Hepworth Art Group to display art and Hepworth 2 Enjoy to be asked for assistance.

- 14. Correspondence Suffolk Preservation Society Membership Renewal agreed. Neighbourhood Watch donation request; Neighbourhood Watch Scheme to be considered at APM; Community Bus donation request to be considered as an option for the S106 monies available.; Carolling all the Way 2018 a carrolling event will be held 14th-16th December 2018 to raise funds for St Nicholas Hospice Care. Information to be passed to Hepworth Singing Angels.; Proposal for monies to plant trees in Hepworth The Tree Warden, Mr P Penn, gave an update on the appeal to find areas in the village where native trees could be planted. One request for oak trees along Wood Lane received. Due to deer damage on existing trees larger trees of 6-8 ft high with protection advisable. Agreed the Parish Council would purchase 10 trees at a cost of £18 each. Mr Penn also has smaller trees and hedging plants available. Mr Penn to contact with local landowners and anyone interested in the scheme should get in touch.
- 15. Questions to the chair Ms L Robinson had been asked by local parishioners to enquire about ownership of the village hall and its management. Mr D Stannard explained that the hall was managed by the Hepworth Recreation Ground Management Committee and contact details for the Committee were given to Ms Robinson to pass on.

The meeting closed at 9.45 pm.

Flooding Reeves Hall, Barningham Road - Report Ref. No. 193781

After much correspondence with Suffolk County Council, we have received information from the Drainage Team stating the fault is their responsibility and not that of the adjacent landowners. The flooding is not considered a priority, according to their Summary of Drainage Schemes and will be added into their programme for possible inclusion in 2019/20 contractors plan and not any earlier. The Drainage Team acknowledge that the local landowner has done everything possible to alleviate the flooding, which is thought to be the result of a blocked council drain beneath the road. The Parish Council would like to thank the landowner for all his efforts to reduce and improve the situation, which is not of his making.

January 2018

A mild, windy month with total rainfall around average. Exceptionally strong winds occurred early morning of the 18th from an 'unnamed' storm, with gusts to 75 mph around 6 am at Hepworth. Unusually, this local area of East Anglia was the worse affected in the UK. Gusts of 73 mph at RAF Mildenhall, 69 mph at Wattisham and 83 mph at Tibenham Airfield (9.5 km NNE of Diss), the highest lowland wind speed that day.

February 2018

A cold month (the coldest February since 2013) with rainfall slightly above normal. From the 26th to the end of the month was the start of an extremely cold and snowy period, lasting in to the beginning of March. Continuous frost for over 33 hours. The maximum temperature on the 28th never rose above -2.2C . There was 11 cm of lying snow on the 28th, the deepest snow cover here since February 2013.

Many can be direct sown into the ground providing your soil has been well prepared; forked over, all weeds removed, then raked and raked. Allow this to settle for a couple of days and then your seeds can be sown. Popular choices for April include Beetroot, Leeks, Onions and Spinach. Salad leaves too, and if you're also keen enough to start some seed sowing indoors or under glass then your seeds will germinate quicker and more reliably. Young salad, and Brassica plants as well, transplant well from seed trays, seedling tubes and the like, compost still intact.

Winter bedding plants such as Pansies, Violas and earlier bulbs will be finishing this month, so remove these from pots and planters and if they are worth caring for over the summer then plant them temporarily in a quiet corner. Then freshen up the planters completely as the compost will have been 'spent' but this doesn't mean it cannot be used in the borders or vegetable plot. Roses should have been pruned by now but if you haven't yet done so at least give them a light prune. It may mean they flower a bit later than otherwise but be sure to remove old dead wood and stems which cross others in the wrong direction.

We all know a gardener or two who we believe to have green fingers! They often get this label as a result of their great looking plants, but in reality, it's often their feeding habits that create such great results, and I don't mean it's what they eat! Feeding garden plants is the easiest way to boost healthy growth, resist pests and diseases and produce fantastic flowers and fruits. Now is the time to give all your plants a boost and there's a plethora of foods available from the almost instant liquid feeds such as Phostrogen and Miracle Gro liquid, to the longer term slower releasing ones such as the organic Bone Meal and Fish Blood and Bone, or the traditional gardeners favourite Growmore.
