



Letter from Reverend Barclay

June 2019

Growth and transformation in Spring

As I write this, Spring-time is in full swing! And I never cease to have a tremendous sense of pleasure and privilege, living and working in Suffolk at this time of the year; all around us is an increasing volume, variety and vitality of new life- in the hedgerows and fields, and on the trees and in our wonderful sky which changes so beautifully in the east anglian light during the morning, noon and evening.

A joy to behold; as young life grows develops and matures before our very eyes and ears and noses (as the sounds and smells grow richer and more varied as spring passes). It seems to me to be like a picture becoming more and more colour-ful and into focus, and somehow more and more real. The different pattern of wild-life although competitive on the surface, has a deeper more complimentary and harmonious undergrowth and over growth- if only we stop for a moment of stillness, and spend time looking at the wholeness of the big picture being revealed before us as the year unfolds, and of which we are all so wondrously a small, yet valuable and significant part in this creation.

However, as I write this also, I have just been involved in investigating serious disease on a farm. Sometimes life processes and production goes wrong; again this is all around us in our natural world, although its causes are often illusive and ignored; due to human activity and interference, or due to powers and influences of and within, and perhaps darkly above nature and the environment – suffering and struggle is the inevitable result. At such times the truth of the existence of a loving God can seem ridiculous, and even repellent.....until again we spend time looking and seeking a bit further. In such situations (and the recent disease problem is no exception), it is my experience that God is present and may be found in the midst of all these events, actions and re-actions of others as well as ourselves- in the resulting reconciliation and healing opportunities. The words of the Old Testament prophet Isaiah are resonant: “If you extend your soul to the hungry and satisfy the afflicted soul, then shall your light dawn in the obscurity, and your darkness shall be as the noonday sun. Then you will call, and the Lord God will answer.”

As the Christian Church enters into the traditional crop and livestock blessing season of “Rogation-tide”, we celebrate in Christ, not only a God of revelation, and reconciliation, but also a God of re-creation. May God Bless us all in our own growth, development and maturity; to become our true selves, belong truly to compliment others, and seek Him in truthfulness in the way ahead and beyond.

Hepworth Remembers

Claude Stuart Lyon

Claude was born in 1882 in Cambridge. His family had links with the city. He had a sister and two half sisters. It appears the family moved to Ireland, as in 1900 Claude was awarded a Humane Society medal for saving a life as a student in Dublin. Soon after he joins Dublin City Artillery. In 1905 he marries Jane Sophia Harden, and the couple had a son in 1908. By 1911 the census shows Claude living as a civilian at a hotel in Russell Square. His wife and son are elsewhere.

In 1914 he rejoins the military and is posted to France. In 1916 he is awarded the Military Cross and the honour of the Bar. He is appointed Major in 1918, and dies on 21st March of that year. He is buried at Favreuil British Cemetery in Pas de Calais.

His half-sister, Geraldine was married to the Rector of Hepworth and the Rector explains that the 'parish on their own initiative claimed him'.

William James Scott

William was born in Bury St Edmunds in 1893, and grew up in St John's Street. In 1911 he is an errand boy living there with his parents. He enlisted at Hepworth, and according to the Hepworth Rector he is one of the first three men to volunteer, and joins the East Surrey 8th Battalion.

It appears he was injured on the 6th or 8th of July 1916, and dies of his wounds, age 23. He is buried at St Pierre Cemetery, Amiens, The Somme with 747 other casualties. He is also remembered at Bury St Edmunds.

John Stearn

John was born in 1896 in Stanton. By 1911 the family lived on the street in Hepworth. John worked as a farm labourer and his father was a horseman. John enlisted at Bury St Edmunds and joined the 2nd Battalion Suffolk Regiment.

John died of wounds on the 8th February 1915, aged just 19. He is buried at Dickebusch Old Military Cemetery, West Valaaderen, Belgium. His brother, William was also badly injured during the war, but survived, came home, married, had a family, and moved to Staffordshire.

John's cousin, Ellen was married to George Claydon, another Hepworth man who was killed in action in 1918.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING MINUTES

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Thursday 4 th April 2019 at the village hall where the following items were discussed.

1. Welcome by Chairman of the Parish Council - Mr D Stannard, welcomed everyone to the meeting
2. Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of 5 th April 2018 were confirmed as a true record
3. Chairman's Report - The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting. He thanked the councillors for their input over the year, and thanked Cllr Spicer and Cllr Bull for all their help and advice both to the Parish Council and individual parishioners. The Chairman also thanked the Clerk. Thanks to Perry Penn, our TreeWarden, and John Horridge who voluntarily keeps many areas of our village tidy. Thanks to our Speedwatch Team, and in particular to Richard Hinton the organiser. There have been a few planning applications. The Shepherds Grove, Stanton planning review has been discussed and feedback, based on parishioners' comments, sent to the developers. The Parish Councillor have supported our Tree Warden, and his tree planting scheme. Our Battles' Over Event on 11 November 2018 went very well. The parish magazine has been relaunched as the Hepworth Herald. Plans are in hand to re-instate the footpath on the Market Weston Road. The Parsh Council are looking at ways to replace or refurbish the village sign. Flooding problems across the road at Reeves Hall are ongoing. A site is being sought for allotments.
4. Hepworth Parochial Church Council - No report was submitted
5. Report from Joanna Spicer – County Councillor - I would like to thank David Stannard and all the Parish Councillors very much for their welcome to me at meetings. Sue Yeomans has been an excellent clerk and I thank her for keeping me in touch with issues in Hepworth. I believe that Carol Bull and I have an effective partnership covering the services provided to you here in Hepworth with the services provided by our Councils. I welcome the new West Suffolk Council which has my full support. I want to particularly congratulate Hepworth on the excellent preparations and celebrations to commemorate the end of the First World War. At the County Council I took on a new role a year ago as Chairman of the Audit Committee. I also play a role in the constitutional side of the Council. I am chairman of the West Suffolk Community Safety Partnership. In May last year the Council elected a new Leader, Matthew Hicks. The new Deputy is Councillor Mary Evans from Clare as Cabinet member for Highways and Transport. We also have a new Chief Executive, Nicola Beach, who joined us from Essex County Council. You may have read in the press about “unitary” councils again being discussed. As with previous reviews I would very much support the principal to save money and create efficiencies – but I am not sure the time is right. But there is a review of County Council division boundaries under way and I suspect my current division of 16 villages and over 8,000 people may increase. The County Council has had to continue the relentless search for savings with the continuing cut in our grant from Government and with reluctance we have put up the Council tax this year. We have made more than £260 million savings since 2011. This year our budget, which excludes money going direct to schools, is around £520 million. The biggest budget pressures continue to be adult care services and child protection. This represents 75% of our expenditure. It is interesting that whenever we do surveys people continue to suggest highways should be our highest priority. The contract that SCC have with Keir is considered to be working better now and the programme for potholes using new technology is making progress. It is really important that the website reporting tool is used. Specifically, in Hepworth:

I have managed to get confirmation of replacing the 40 MPH VAS on the A143 which has died.

The biggest worry for your village this time last year was the flood close to Reeves Hall. CC engineers

believe there is a broken drain pipe underneath the road. They seem slow to do the urgent investigation it needs.

Changes have been agreed to the provision of school transport. Hepworth children will no longer get free transport to Thurston Community College – only to Ixworth Free School. This only affects new year 7 children from this September

Another big issue is the possibility of a significant development on the Shepherds Grove Park, Stanton. I am keeping in touch with the developers jointly with CC officers. I have ensured that the impact on Hepworth is included in the CC's formal response as well as my own.

Cllr Spicer presented David Stannard, the outgoing Chairman of the Parish Council, with a Long Service Certificate marking his more than 25 years on the Parish Council, 15 of which have been as Chairman. David Ray, who was a Borough Councillor for more than 10 years during David's councillorship, also thanked him for his sterling long service to the village.

6. Report from Carol Bull – Borough Councillor - Clearly looking at the turnout tonight this new format for the Annual Parish Meeting is proving very successful. I am pleased to report that we did get a waste bin installed at the layby on the B143 and also sorted out the regular collection of black rubbish bags from the layby in the village where Clare leaves them after her litter picking walks. I also managed to get the Borough to provide the black bags for free. I was also able from my Locality Budget to make contributions to the re-launch of the Hepworth Herald and the Battles Over event. I know there are a lot of other village projects being considered: setting up allotments, provision of a village noticeboard and work to update the pavilion and I hope in the coming year to support these things in any way I can. Like Joanna Spicer and David Ray I would also like to acknowledge the long service of your Chairman David and wish him all the very best in his “retirement”. There has also been an enormous amount going on at Borough level with the coming together of St Edmundsbury Borough Council and Forest Heath District Council and as of this Monday 1 April we are now officially one council – the West Suffolk council. The reason behind it is very simple, it is to ensure that as a council we are able to maintain, and where possible improve, our services to the community despite the huge funding cuts we experience from Government. At the moment we are in the build up to Local elections both for the new West Suffolk Council and Parish and Town councils. Earlier this evening I was informed that I have not been contested so I am very pleased to say I shall be continuing as your ward councillor.

7. Report by Police - No police representative attended and no report was submitted

8. Reports from Hepworth Community Groups

Hepworth Art – Wendy Summerell- We are now into our 10th year. We currently have 21 members and a long waiting list. The standard of art work produced by our members is amazing. We have an outing in June to the Van Gogh exhibition in London. We are holding our Annual Art Exhibition in the Pavilion on the 5th and 6th October 2019. A selection of Art Work is on display this evening.

Hepworth Angels – Clare Jones-Davies - The Hepworth Angels (singing group) practice on a Monday evening in the Church, at the moment we are singing songs from the musicals, all good fun and very casual. We desperately need someone who can play the piano to help us start off on the right note!!! Please, if anyone can help us contact me, you would be so welcome. Clare Jones-Davies. 01359 250 660

Hepworth Speedwatch Team – Richard Hinton, Co-ordinator - I would like to thank the Speedwatch Team, we have been doing at least 1 session a month over the past year. We do still need more members. If you could spare 1 hour a month and would like to join our team contact me on 01359 251484 or Sue Yeomans, Clerk. There is very little police involvement now, we regularly submit our data but never hear back. We aim to be a deterrent; we are highly visible with signage and our fluorescent jackets. Our SID (Speed Indicator Device) regularly moves about the village, maintained by David Yeomans. We recently recorded speeds of 65mph and 68mph at the A143 end of The Street, coming into the village.

Hepworth Herald – Neel Shearer - The Hepworth Herald is a bimonthly magazine distributed free to all the residents of Hepworth. We print 240 copies each edition, and this is funded completely by our advertisers and a grant from the Parish Council. It is distributed very quickly and effectively by Pat, Chris and their team, and grateful thanks go to them for their continued backing. We love to get contributions from residents, and over the last year, we have featured the continuing adventures of our Hepworth housewife, a recipe for parsnip soup, some beautiful artwork and photographs for our cover, a continuing weather almanac, speedwatch news, and articles about events and fundraisers that happen in the village. We also publish a condensed version of the minutes of the Parish Council Meetings. We will continue to print small biographies of the men of the village who fought and died in the Great War, over 100 years ago, and we hope to bring you news of the many events in the What's On section. If anyone would like to contribute articles, recipes, artwork or anything else at all, we really would love to hear from you. Finally, I would also like to make special thanks to David Fennell and Nicola Yorke who provided essential proofreading and accounting skills respectively, both of whom have handed on their batons in the last 12 months. If any villagers would like to contribute time to our small team, contact details can be found in every edition of the Herald. (hepworthherald@gmail.com)

Hepworth Bee Cooperative – Geoff Beckett - We have 4 beekeepers, ours is a very loose arrangement with no regular meetings, just supporting and helping each other with David Yeomans providing advice. We are all members of the West Suffolk Bee Keepers. We are continually amazed at just how much there is to learn. Anyone interested in keeping bees please contact me on 01359 252166.

Hepworth2Enjoy – Sue Yeomans - A fluid group of like-minded people who enjoy putting on fun, not for profit, social events. In 2018 we organised a Burns Night Supper, Scarecrow Competition with Cream Tea, Curry Evening and Christmas Get Together. This year so far, we have hosted a Pancake Extravaganza. Still to come we have a Cheese, Wine and Quiz Evening and a Bingo with Buffet Bash. We also help with the ever-popular St George's Day Supper. We welcome any suggestions for events, and any offers of help.

Hepworth Recreation Ground Committee – Dave Stannard - The Pavilion is used on a regular basis by The Art Group, Martial Arts Club, Parish Council, Café Hepworth, a band several evenings a month and outside football teams. It is also used for children's parties, wedding receptions and funeral wakes. It is hoped to decorate the hall over the next year. The accounts have not been completed for year end 31 March 2019 but a summary is as follows: - Income approx. £4,000 (Lettings £3,000, Lottery £1,000), Expenses £5,000, (includes grass cutting £1,000; cleaning £1,000; £500 Insurance; approx. £800 for gas; plus water, electricity and maintenance) Reserves of £27,000 due to a legacy left by a local resident.

Tree Warden – Peregrine Penn - I am currently working on a project to plant 13 trees for the 13 soldiers who fell in WWI, and who were honoured in our Battles Over Event in Nov 2018. Display boards are on show this evening.

9. Parishioners Comments - The following ideas were collected from our 'Post-it Suggestion Board': - More flowers planted around the village; 'Slow Down' stickers for bins; Memorial Garden for war dead; A prominent notice board for advertising village events; Path ways; a Gardening Club for green fingered individuals; Litter Picking needed down Market Weston Road; with regard to Shepherds Grove Development – could we ask the developers to install Average Speed Cameras in The Street as part of the acceptance. Cllr A Yorke thanked David Stannard, on behalf of the parishioners, for all his work and dedication during his councillorship. David responded saying he had very much enjoyed his time with the council, he had found it no problem with good councillors and a clerk to support him.

10. The meeting closed at 9.20 pm

David Stannard

After 25 years' service, and 15 years as Chairman, David Stannard is to officially retire from Hepworth Parish Council on 9th May 2019.

David first moved to Hepworth with his wife Geraldine and daughter Tracy in April 1981. He worked for the Merchant Navy until 1984, when for medical reasons, he was forced to change career. He became a 'Handy Man' Builder, whose expertise was soon sought after in the construction of a new village hall in 1988.

On the eve of his departure, David wanted to express his gratitude to the people of Hepworth and county governance support: "The help we received from the Borough and County Councillors over the years has been excellent; they have been really helpful to us."

"But most importantly of all, I appreciate all the help my Parish Council colleagues and villagers have assisted with over the years, they made my job so much easier."

When asked about what David likes most about Hepworth, he said: "I just like the community spirit, everybody in the village is ever so friendly, it's nice to walk down the street and everyone says 'hello,' it's just a nice village community."

As a token of recognition, at the Hepworth Annual Parish Meeting, David was presented with a Suffolk Association of Local Councils Long Service Award, by West Suffolk County Councillor Joanna Spicer.

March 2019: A mild month and the first month of the year to have near normal rainfall, the other two both being deficient in totals. However, 92% of the months total fell in the first half of March. A very 'westerly', windy month, especially the first half. On the 9th, a violent squall arrived around midday with heavy rain and hail and winds gusting to 63 mph. This was during a period of very strong winds up to the 16th, with frequent gusts of 40 - 50 mph.

April 2019: An exceptionally dry month (continuing on from the second half of March) with only 17% of normal rainfall. The driest April since 2011. Now very concerning for farmers and growers. The first half of the month was rather cool with some night frosts. A dramatic change for the second half with mostly warm, frost free, sunny weather.


