

A Letter from the Rectory - February 2023

Dear Friends & Neighbours, I love a good story ...don't you?

I grew up loving Beauty and the Beast, C.S Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe and the Last Battle and I love the classics like Pride and Prejudice, and Emma and then there's The Hobbit, The Lord of the Rings... and The Shawshank Redemption... and so many more; some of them

are stories I've read, some of them are films I've watched. In all of them the characters and the storyline are really important. Right from childhood most of the fairy stories we're read or told are to do with the struggle of good overcoming bad so the hero or heroine can live a new and better life. Cinderella escapes her difficult homelife to marry the prince, Pinocchio become a real boy, the ugly duckling becomes a swan and even Scrooge is reformed.

Stories are good for us... and stories that demonstrate good winning over evil, people being saved and characters becoming the best version of themselves... (especially when they are true) are transformational.

At Easter we're reminded of the most amazing and transformational story since the story of the first Christmas. TRAVELS DOWNUNDER - A REMINISCENCE Part 13

Having swapped stories round the campfire near The Pinnacles our travellers move on to their next adventure...

Following on from our interesting overnight bushcamp at Cervantes, we set off again heading north, following the coast as much as possible. The distances between places of any note in Western Australia can be quite large. It is wise to always set out with a full fuel tank and provisions as you can never be certain where you might get the chance to fill up again. Next stop was Geraldton, a moderate size city, (well it calls itself a city but it's really only a moderate size town, population about 38 thousand) where we stopped for four nights. It is around this area that in spring is a magnet for visitors to see the wildflowers in the countryside. They really are spectacular and can carpet vast areas. Sadly for us it was approaching autumn so we were there at the wrong time of year for that. Some years later we made a subsequent visit in the spring and it was well worth the visit.

From Geraldton our next stop was Kalbarri, a small coastal town where we had an unfortunate adventure. We like to get out into the bush for walks as often as we can and we were recommended a particular walk which follows a river in a circular route and should have taken about four or five hours.

Signs at the start of the waymarked route advised us how much water we should take with us but also warned that recent flooding meant part of the route was not passable. We decided to give it a go even though we didn't have the recommended amount of water. This almost proved fatal. After a couple of hours of walking we were attempting to follow the river but eventually realised that an awful lot of the waymarkers had been washed away in the floods. Suffice to say we got lost and having eaten our lunch we were now down to insufficient quantity of water. We carried on for another hour or so and eventually found our way back on what we thought was the right track.

By this time our water was all gone and it looked like we still had a long way to go. Fortunately for us a young couple of hikers were on the same trail as us and eventually caught us up. By the time they reached us my wife was getting very lightheaded and disoriented, and declared she couldn't go on. Luckily this young couple had plenty of water which they shared with us and they stayed with us and guided us back to the start of the trail to where we had left our car. If they had not come along I dread to think what might have happened to us. It was a salutary lesson which we never forgot, and we made sure we never put ourselves in that situation again.

Having frightened ourselves we stayed an extra night and spent the next day recovering and resting before setting out again for the intriguingly named resort of Monkey Mia (there are no monkeys in Australia) which is in Shark Bay (there are lots of sharks in Australia)



HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL -MINUTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HEPWORTH PAVILION- THURSDAY 19 JANUARY 2023 @ 7.30 PM

- PRESENT: Councillor Garry Bloomfield (GB) (Chair), Councillor Marjorie MacPherson (MM), Councillor Louise Robinson (LR), Councillor Perry Penn (PP), Councillor Nicholas Bennett (NB), Councillor Justin Seldis (JS), Councillor Hollie Bloomfield (HB) from 23/008, Councillor Christine Price (CP) from 23/008
- IN ATTENDANCE: Christopher Garman (Parish Clerk) (CG), County Councillor Joanna Spicer (JSp), District Councillor Carol Bull (CB), Two members of public were present.
- 23/001 PUBLIC FORUM: There was a discussion on the issues and concerns with the Shepherds Grove proposed development.
- 23/002 REPORTS FROM AND QUESTIONS TO BOTH DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS: a) JSp spoke about progress with the traffic calming project with work starting in March 2023 weather permitting. JSp confirmed that the resurfacing of Weston Lane should happen shortly. JSp spoke about SCC's approach to the consultation in respect of the Shepherds Grove proposed road changes and traffic flows.

b) CB spoke about voter identification being needed for the May elections, the change of approach to WSC's use of weedkillers and additional council tax support. 23/003 APOLOGIES None.

- 23/004 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST None.
- 23/005 REQUESTS FOR DISPENSATIONS None.
- 23/006 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETINGS The minutes of the meetings held on 10 November 2022, 17 November 2022 and 14 December 2022 had been previously circulated. It was resolved that these were an accurate record of the meetings. 23/007 MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES None.
- 23/008 VACANCIES FOR PARISH COUNCILLORS There were two applications for the two Parish Councillor vacancies. It was resolved to co-opt Hollie Bloomfield and Christine Price as Parish Councillors
- 23/009 VILLAGE ASSETS, TREES AND HIGHWAYS a) There had previously been an update in respect of the traffic calming project. b) There had previously been an update on the resurfacing of Weston Lane.
- 23/010 FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: a) The following payments was considered for approval. £25.00 to Royal British Legion – donation £160.71 to C Garman – Parish Clerk's expenses October – December 2022 £40.00 to Just a Small Thing – website hosting fee. It was resolved to approve these payments.

b) The revised draft budget for 2023/2024 had been previously circulated was considered. There was discussion on the level of precept and it was agreed to keep any increase to 3% and to use reserves if needed to cover the predicted deficit of £1,419. There were no other changes. It was resolved to approve the revised draft budget for 2023/2024 and to request a precept of £7,855 from West Suffolk Council.

c) An increase in the Parish Clerk's salary back dated to 1 April 2022 in line with NALC recommendations and employment contract was considered. It was resolved to increase the Parish Clerk's salary to £13.45 per hour and back dated to 1 April 2022.

d) The resignation of the Parish Clerk was noted. There was a discussion about the recruitment process for a new Parish Clerk. This will be advertised as widely as possible with a closing date of 15 February 2023. Applications can then be considered at the next meeting on 16 February 2023.

23/011 PLANNING MATTER: a) The summary of councillors concerns and issues had been previously circulated and were considered in depth. The feedback from the

Stanton councillors present following their visit to the Colchester site of Co Part was welcome. This raised further issues. It was decided that some councillors will visit the Sandy Bedford site of Co Part and to understand how that site has effected that local community. It was decided to proceed with an extra ordinary Parish Council meeting on Friday 27 January 2023 to focus on this planning application and allow residents to state their views and to answer where possible questions. It was noted that JSp would not be at the meeting but CB planned to attend. JSp had previously stated that an officer at SCC had be assigned the task of responding to the consultation on behalf of SCC. It was noted that the Parish Council would like to meet with that officer so local concerns were fully understood. JSp advised that a meeting was unlikely but councillors considered this was essential.

b) There was no report on other applications.

23/012 CORRESPONDENCE: a) The response from Anglian Water in respect to the formal complaint about the number of leaks and road closures was considered. It was noted that there had been a further two leaks. However, for the time being, no further action was considered appropriate.

b) It was noted that there had been no response to the email to Stanton Surgery concerning the poor service from the dispensary. CB advised that she was having a meeting with the practice manager shortly to discuss the concerns.

23/013 CORONATION EVENT An event to celebrate the King's coronation on or round 6 May 2023 was considered. However, it was felt that the Parish Council with all else going on could not undertake to organise an event but funds were available should another village group wish to organise an event.

23/014 QUESTIONS TO THE CHAIR

a) It was confirmed there was no progress by SCC with the Quiet Lanes Suffolk project.

b) It was understood there were pollution issues from water coming from Shepherds Grove. This had been reported to both the Environment Agency and WSC but there had been little interest. CB said she would follow this through with WSC.

c) There was a discussion about a joint meeting with other parish Councils about the Shepherds Grove development. It was understood this might happen in due course.

23/015 DATE OF NEXT MEETING: The next Parish Council meeting which will be an extra ordinary meeting on Friday 27 January 2023 and then a meeting on Thursday 16 February 2023 at 7.30 pm.

The meeting closed at 9.35 pm.

There was a welcome from the chairman.
- 23/016 PUBLIC FORUM: The members of the public were given the opportunity to speak about the planning application for the proposed development at Shepherds Grove, Stanton. A summary of the questions and points raised were:
- a) There was a suggestion on how the Parish Council should handle their response. It

was thought that a WSC planning officer should meet with councillors and residents and explain this complex application.

- b) There was a request to explain how the business of Copart operates.
- c) It was suggested that there would be a vehicle every two minutes and there was concern how this would meet the green climate pledges from both WSC and SCC.
- d) There was a question on how the plots earmarked for outline permission would be used. It was acknowledged that this information is not available.
- e) There was comment on the adequacy of the number of on-site parking spaces and that the site was located away from the main roads.
- f) There was discussion about the proposed business and how that compares with Copart's operations at their other sites.
- g) It was suggested that the outline planning application might not be legally possible.
- h) There was discussion about the proposed village traffic calming plans and how these would fit with the proposed plans.
- i) There were concerns that the A143 and other roads were already in a poor condition.
- j) There was a thought that the water run-offs could eventually affect the quality of water in the aquifers.
- k) There was clarification sought about the planned site opening hours.
- l) There were concerns about light pollution.
- m) There were comments about the environmental assessments and the independence of the surveys.
- n) There was the question of who would benefit from such a business on this site.
- o) There was a discussion on whether the Parish Council should seek professional advice from a planning consultant.
- p) There was a conversation about the highway's issues and the impact of the increased traffic.
- q) It was considered this business was just too much for the locality.
- 23/017 APOLOGIES: None.
- 23/018 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST: None.
- 23/019 REQUESTS FOR DISPENSATIONS: None.
- 23/020 PLANNING MATTERS: There was discussion on the next stages in the preparation of the response to planning applications DC/22/2190/HYB and DC/ 22/2191/ADV. It was agreed that a formal invitation would be given to Gary Hancox, the WSC planning officer, to come to a meeting and explain the application. It was also agreed to engage with Peter Bradfield, the SCC highways officer, who would be responding on behalf of SCC to the highway's issues. The visit by some councillors to another Copart location is planned.

- 23/024 PUBLIC FORUM: There was comment that the proposed developments at Shepherds Grove, Stanton, would be located in an inappropriate location. There was discussion around the proposed development.

There was disappointment that the reasonable request for a WSC planning officer to come to a public meeting was declined. It was noted that Peter Bradfield, the SCC officer responding to the consultation, was willing to talk over the local concerns and NB was asked to contact him to. LR and NB gave a report on their recent visit to Wisbech where they observed the operations of Copart. It was suggested CB needed chasing on the question of the outline application for change of use and its validity. It was considered there were huge gaps in the information provided to make at this point a response. It was agreed that CG would draft a holding objection response to application DC/22/2190/HYB and in respect of DC/22/2191/ADV an objection based on the inappropriate location for commercial advertising. These will be reviewed at the next meeting.
- 23/028 QUESTIONS TO THE CHAIR: a) CG asked about the recruitment process for the new Parish Clerk. It was agreed that arrangements should be put in place to interview candidates.

b) It was noticed at a recent meeting that some residents were unaware of the plans for the traffic calming scheme. It was decided to put a brief outline of the works in the next edition of the Hepworth Herald.

An amendment was suggested mentioning that Clay Lane was a designated Quiet Lane. It was resolved to send to WSC the holding objection setting out concerns about the lack of information and the need for clarification.

b) The draft response to planning application DC/22/2191/ADV relating to land at Shepherds Grove Industrial Estate, Hepworth which had been previously circulated was reviewed. It was resolved to send to WSC the objection on the basis it was an inappropriate location for advertising.

23/040 CORRESPONDENCE: a) GB had spoken with the practice manager at Stanton Surgery and CB had also had a meeting and it was noted that they are taking actions to improve the service from the dispensary.

b) Other correspondence had been previously circulated and no further action was needed.

23/041 QUESTIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN: a) It was reported that Orbit Housing still had not taken any action in respect of the hedges at North Drive and South Drive. This is to be chased again.

b) It was agreed there would be a village litter pick on Saturday 25 March 2023.

c) It was noted that various village groups were considering an event for the Coronation. It was mentioned there are some funds held by the Parish Council if needed.




