From the Rectory

Dear Friends,

It seems crazy to me that we are in December already ! The Churches across the Benefice are all preparing for Christmas and prepare to welcome you all into our Carol Services; the choir, singers and band are already busy rehearsing to lead our carol singing.

"Silent Night! Holy Night! All is calm, all is bright..." is just one of the many carols that is loved and sung every year.

One of the reasons I think that this carol is so popular is because of the way it invites us right into the heart of Christmas... into the still centre of the Christmas story, to contemplate Mary holding the new-born Jesus, the Light of the World.

It's that time of year when the streets and shops are full of bright, festive lights and we start to think about getting our own Christmas lights down from the loft to see if they still work ready for this year's Christmas tree. It's easy to connect with the 'bright' part of this theme from the carol but what about the 'calm'? As we join other frantic shoppers, looking for the perfect but affordable gift, as we stock up our cupboards the best we can with foody treats and begin the countdown to Christmas, it's easy to lose any sense of calm.

As we watch the news and look at events in other part of the world. 'calm' doesn't seem to be the right word to describe what is going on at the moment. Bethlehem certainly isn't calm this Christmas. HEPWORTH PARISH COUNCIL - DRAFT MINUTES OF MEETING HEPWORTH PAVILION - THURSDAY 17th OCTOBER 24 @ 7.30pm

- PRESENT: Councillor Garry Bloomfield (GB) (Chair), Councillor Nicholas Bennett (NB) (Vice Chair), Councillor Marjorie MacPherson (MM), Councillor Louise Robinson (LR), Councillor Hollie Williams (HW)
- IN ATTENDANCE: Andy Osman (Parish Clerk) (AO), Two members of the public were also in attendance
- 24/102 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST: MM declared an interest in agenda item 8b, DC/24/1324/HH planning application.
- 24/103 APOLOGIES: Cllr Perry Penn sent apologies which were accepted.
- 24/104 PUBLIC FORUM: a. Clarkes of Walsham Sign. The sign at the junction of Clay Lane/A143 erected on 5 October was queried. It was agreed that the Clerk would clarify with West Suffolk Council whether express consent had been given for the sign.

b. Bidwells Sign. MM highlighted that the Bidwells sign had been in place for a while, it was agreed that the Clerk would clarify the consent given for this sign with West Suffolk Council

c. Glamping Pod. An email update from District Cllr Carol Bull confirmed that this application would be reconsulted due to new information being provided.

24/105 REPORTS FROM AND QUESTIONS TO BOTH DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLORS County Cllr Joanna Spicer and District Cllr Carol Bull email updates had been previously circulated. a. Save Our Buses. LR updated the meeting with recent discussions from the Save Our Buses Working Party. It was noted that Hepworth were currently included in a bid being put together for bus services in 2025 once the current interim service funded by Suffolk County Council ends. Communities using this interim solution, including Hepworth, were encouraged to use service to support the future bid. There will be gap from January to April 25 when the interim service ends and any new service starts. The meeting agreed that if a bus cannot be provided in the longer term a shuttle service to a bus stop, ie Stanton, should be provided. The current situation of young people using unlit and non-existing footpaths to bus stops was noted as being unacceptable.

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- 24/106 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING: Minutes of the meeting held on 12 September 24 had been previously circulated and it was resolved that these were an accurate record of the meetings.
- 24/107 MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES: The Chair confirmed all actions from the last meeting had been completed or would be covered in later agenda items.
- 24/108 FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: a. Finance Report. The meeting noted the finance report (current account balance £6,742.64, savings account balance £7,000.00 and the projected outturn at the end of the FY of approx. £4,000 current account and £7,000 savings account). The following payment was authorised: SALC Payroll £22.80; NB agreed to provide 2nd bank authorisation. A final payment of £760 plus VAT to Ashtons Legal for work on the lease renewal was also agreed

b. Parish Council Meeting Dates 2025/26. The proposed meeting dates for 2025/26 were agreed.

c. Lease Renewal. MM reported that the final signatories were being obtained on behalf of Hepworth Recreation Ground Management Committee to allow the renewed lease to come into force on 1 November 2024.

24/109 PLANNING MATTERS: a. DC/24/0475/FUL. The meeting agreed to support this application.

b. DC/24/1324/HH. The meeting agreed to support this application.

c. Feedback on face-to-face meeting with West Suffolk Council. GB and NB provided an update on the recent meeting with West Suffolk Council over the management DC/22/2190/HYB planning application. It was agreed that the Clerk would: (1) Generate a FOI request to West Suffolk Council seeking a copy of the legal advice used following the withdrawal of COPART from this planning application. (2) Seek an explanation from West Suffolk Council of the reasons for the delay in determining DC/23/1154/OUT and the planned date when it would be determined. The continued delay in determining this application was causing unnecessary concern and anxiety within the village 24/110 HIGHWAYS MATTERS: a. Roads Repairs. The meeting noted recent repairs conducted on The Street could increase standing water on the road. This would be reported on the Suffolk Highways Reporting tool by the member of the public raising the concern.

b. Drainage Issue. LR highlighted a potential drainage issue on The Street and agreed to report on the Suffolk Highways Reporting tool.

c. Clay Lane Potholes. HW agreed to report potholes on Clay Lane.

Save Our Buses

The Task Force continues to work hard to ensure that our rural villages will have an ongoing bus service. Thanks to Suffolk County Council we have a bus service until 27th December and by working collaboratively with the service provider, Simonds, this is now working well.

Currently, we are focused on our submission to Suffolk County Council's Bus Service Improvement Plan fund to enable the Bus service no 73 to continue, as well as vital funding to support buses for students not eligible for Suffolk County Council school transport. Without these bus services school children, students and workers will face difficulties in getting to school, college or work. Some people have already told us they could lose their jobs. The 73 is also a lifeline for all those people without cars, as this bus service is the only public transport through the villages.

We are heartened by the political support and the service provider's willingness to work with us to find ways to achieve a sustainable bus service. We need people to use the buses so that they can become commercially viable as soon as possible. We also need Suffolk County Council to help us to bridge the financial gap which currently exists.

We shall continue to work proactively and constructively with all parties to achieve a solution for our rural communities.



Having left them at the scenic Carnarvon Gorge, our travellers are nearing the end of their adventures...

We are nearing the end of our epic trip now and are only a couple of weeks away from our starting point at Maroochydore.

After leaving Carnarvon Gorge we carried on southwards passing through Injune to the town of Roma, a large Outback Queensland town. This is cattle country and Roma boasts the largest cattle sale yards in the southern hemisphere. We made a point of going along to the sale yards on a sale day and it was truly fascinating, a really entertaining free day out! We got talking to an old fella who told us he was a hobby farmer, meaning he only had a small property and only about a hundred head of cattle, which is considered small by Aussie standards. He was there to sell some of them. He used a local agent who handled the sale for him and his sale took barely a minute or two. It is all very fast and furious and the auctioneer walks on gangways above the cattle pens and before you know it another herd is sold.

From Roma we made our way to Toowoomba up on the Darling Downs, and after a couple of nights there we finally returned to the very first campsite we stayed at right at the start of our trip ten months before, at Crows Nest. When we checked in there we told the manager the story of our epic trip and that we had started and finished at their campsite, and that evening in the communal camp dining room we got a round of applause from the other campers amid shouts of "well done to the Poms who have just completed a circumnavigation of our wonderful country".

From Crows Nest we decided to take a few days R & R at the beach and headed for the wonderfully named Tin Can Bay. Three nights, and a couple of days lazing on the beach watching the fishing boats, we finally headed off back to our son's home in Maroochydore, job done, we had successfully encircled the whole country. What an epic adventure, the memories will stay with us forever, and also the many friends we made along the way and are still in touch with to this day.

Some statistics:

We traveled a total of 38,000 kilometres.

We used 4,850 Litres of fuel

Which cost Au\$ 6,800

It took us 10 months, and, apart from when I played golf, we were together 24/7 for 10 months, a true test of any marriage!

PASSION FOR PIGEONS - Part 5

Just to give readers an insight into how pigeons are raced. There are 2 basic methods Natural and Widowhood.

With Natural system the pigeons are paired together and sent to the races either sitting on eggs or feeding babies.

The widowhood system both sexes can be raced with the sexes being kept apart and only get together for some fun on the return from the race. (Anyone who has worked away from home will get the gist of what I mean).

Pigeons are really resilient to survive and hold up if lost, and survive feeding from bird feeders etc until they feel fit enough to leave. A change of wind direction or a thunderstorm that clears the heat out of the air usually results with birds returning after said events.

Regarding racing there are 3 main levels in this country.

- 1. Club racing where fanciers race against other fanciers in their area.
- 2. Federation racing against other fanciers in their county and finally
- 3. National racing which is self-explanatory.

My son and I race all 3 which most fanciers do. We belong to The Diss & District for club racing, The Norfolk & Suffolk Championship Club for Federation racing, and The North Road Championship Club which broadly covers from Retford down to London.

The preferred route at the present time is North into Scotland as far as Lerwick approximately 550 miles.

We used to fly South into France with The British International Championship Club as far as Pau - 623 miles, but due to legislation since leaving The EU, this has become too expensive for us.

So locally, who have we that has done exceptionally well? Our own Jimmy Davis won the BICC when racing in London. Pete & Terri Rogers of Hopton won the NRCC twice when living at a different location. Mauri Ward from East Harling won the NRCC from Lerwick. The late great Brian Long from Gipping won the BICC twice - once being from Barcelona! One of the best sprint men (up to 200 miles) lives at Attleborough - Bob Fenech.

Sadly the best we have done to date is win 3 separate Federation races with 3 different pigeons all on the same day.

May I take this opportunity of wishing everybody a very Happy Christmas.
